4th Worldwide WFCCN Survey

WFCCN lead investigators recently completed the write-up of the results of the 4th Worldwide Survey for publication. The purpose of the survey was to profile the activities and concerns of critical care nurses and professional critical care nursing organizations (CCNOs) around the world and identify expectations of nursing leaders and policy makers. Led by WFCCN Founding President Ged Williams and Prof Paul Fulbrook, the study represents the fourth worldwide review of its type. Three prior surveys were undertaken by WFCCN in 2001, 2005 and 2009, with 23, 51 and 65 countries respectively. Of the 59 respondents, 43 (73%) had CCNOs established in their countries. Africa, Asia, Europe, Middle East and The Americas were represented.

The results revealed that the services provided by CCNOs of most value were national conferences, website, professional representation and practice standards and guidelines (Table). Collectively, the most important issues for critical care nurses were identified as working conditions, the need for formal practice guidelines and competencies, staffing levels, and access to quality education programs.

Findings from the study can be used by nursing leaders and policy makers to better strategize and provide support to address the needs of critical care nurses as well as focus the activities and priorities of future researchers and academics throughout the world as they continue to promote excellence in critical care practice on a global level.

Critical Care Nursing and Ebola Virus Disease

Increased global attention to the growing Ebola Virus Disease (EVD) has also highlighted the importance of critical care nursing in the management of critically ill patients. In West Africa, a significant number of nurses caring for patients with EVD have died.



An international response has resulted with increased medical aid being focused in affected areas worldwide as well as increased dissemination of information on infection control principles and EVD management concepts. In the United States, two critical care nurses were infected with EVD while caring for an ICU patient; they both have since recovered from their illness. However, media coverage as well as increased promotion of public health and infectious disease standards has resulted in focused attention at critical care nursing.

EVD is a severe, often fatal illness, with a reported case fatality rate of up to 90%. The infection is transmitted by direct contact with the blood, body fluids and tissues of infected animals or people. EVD has been identified as one of the world's most virulent diseases and severely ill patients often require ICU treatment.

WFCCN is promoting awareness of educational resources for critical care nurses as well as advocating for adequate working conditions and infection control resources for nurses. According to the International Council of Nursing (ICN), nurses are among the people at highest risk of getting infected with Ebola. Adequate education and training and availability of appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) are necessary for nurses who are caring for patients with EVD. The World Health Organization estimates that a total of 443 health-care workers are known to have been infected and 244 have died. Ebola infections among healthcare workers can have devastating effects on health systems, including closure of hospitals, depletion of the much needed healthcare workforce and distrust in the health system. The World Federation of Societies of Intensive and Critical Care Medicine has asked member societies to disseminate key points for critical care professionals, developed in conjunction with the National Disease Forecast Center:



- ANYONE receiving a patient in the ICU setting suspected to have come from Africa should be vigilant for viral hemorrhagic fever until proven otherwise.
- The footprint of the Ebola epidemic continues to expand and now includes Nigeria. A medical response unit which was set up in Liberia has now been seriously compromised with the infection of its American medical director and an American aid worker. There are other reports of infection in international aid workers is a strong possibility.
- The security situation is deteriorating rapidly, with a particular focus on Sierra Leone and Liberia. Should Lagos, Nigeria report more cases, maximal disruption and deterioration of security is expected there as well.
- The core issue in the involved West African countries is failure to engage the public in proactive education. While there are signs of improvement in Liberia and Sierra Leone, there is significant ongoing disruption with gross signs of containment failure in international response organization-run clinics.
- •It is unlikely that transmission, infection and fatalities will cease any time in the near future until the indigenous populations cooperate with local and international public health officials. This includes infection and fatalities among indigenous and international responder healthcare staff.
- •What this means for the critical care community is an ever-increasing probability of translocation by air flight given the number of urban areas involved with France being particularly exposed. Vigilance in the emergency department, inpatient, and intensive care settings is strongly recommended.
